# Mère St. Jean

Well, we promised a follow-up to the last issue of the Newsletter, and this one is full of the resonances of Mère St. Jean. There is the inspiration of her life, and her continuing influence through all of the last 160 years, reaching right down to today's school children; then there is the dedication and service of her present-day daughters, so much in the tradition that Père Gailhac and Mère St. Jean strove to establish; there are reflections from Extended Family members around the world; and news of developments in one corner of that world.



### **Rathmore Grammar School, Belfast**

We began bringing small groups of teachers to the Mother House some years ago and they found it such a good experience that we have continued the practice each year, and last year and again this year brought a group of governors on a separate trip. Both teachers and governors have given us very positive feedback: the hospitality and warm welcome of the Mother House community and that of the Bon Pasteur, the opportunity to get to know one another in a more personal way, the value of putting what we do here in Rathmore into a broader context, discovering our "roots", getting to know the sisters, learning about the Founder, Foundress, early sisters and who and where we are as RSHM today, the background to and deeper meaning of our school motto, "Ut Vitam Habeant", which is that of the Congregation - all this as well as the camaraderie of journeying together and spending some time together away from our daily routine.

It has struck me how the Spirit works in these groups, far beyond my expectations, as some people have told me how personally renewing and healing they have found the experience. One consequence of it is our Founders' week which we celebrate each year in school. We still have work to do on it to make it really

vibrant. Some very enthusiastic teachers organised the acquisition of wall hangings (maybe 6ft by 4ft) of the Founder and Foundress which we display for the week as well as giving input at school assemblies by way of a power-point presentation on our origins. We also incorporate some of the history into our First Year's Citizenship programme. These initiatives came from staff who had been to Béziers and I was only too happy to support them.

I feel we never get round to doing enough. I would love to bring pupils over, for example, and then there is the whole question of who to bring given that we have 1260 pupils and at what time of year as the school leaders are in Upper Six and very busy with various outreach and charity projects throughout the year. We did bring a group some years ago for our 150th celebrations. Maybe my successor will manage something here. *Sr. Ursula Canavan. Principal* 



# La Maison Mère, Béziers

The fourth and final meeting for this year of Mère St. Jean was held on 14th May 2009.

There were a good thirty or so of us, to recall Mère St. Jean and the first Sisters, her daughters.

At each of the round tables, led in turn by the members of the presenting team, we were reminded of a significant feature of the story: the life, the trials, and the courage of Mère St. Jean, the General Superior; then of Mère Ste. Croix who took over from her on her death; and finally of Mère St. Félix, who succeeded Mère Ste. Croix, and supported our revered Father until his death.





At this latest meeting, Sr. Marion demonstrated how the Institute is engaged today in the struggle against human slavery, especially that of women and children. These meetings, which are so prayerful and rewarding for us were a time of grace which we hope to renew next year.
