RSHM sisters will be well aware of Sr. Kathleen O'Keeffe and her work, but for the rest of us, part of her ministry is as Institute Fundraiser for Africa. It was in this capacity that she undertook the monitoring visits mentioned here. Her letter arrived at just the right time, as one of the questions we considered at Noddfa was what activities local EF groups could undertake. Could this be one suggestion? Below is some of the information from the Newsletter on the RSHM web-site, which also includes more pictures and another article on the visit by Sr. Cathy Minhoto.

What's in a Name?

From September 9th until September 22nd, Cathy Minhoto and I truly experienced how as RSHM we are "living the Mission Statement more authentically by sharing our resources, financial and personnel, beyond boundaries of Provinces and Regions" (2007 Gen Chap) in our commitment to women and children in Zambezi and in our commitment to sustainability and succession in the future. In driving, perspiring, laughing and sometimes crying in our journeys from Lusaka to Mutare, I was able, with the help of Breda Shelly (EAP), to monitor all projects funded through Misean Cara in the Zambezi Region.

Lusaka: Kalingalinga: Pre-school for orphans (Umoyo Day Center) - 96 of them!



Choma: St. Mulumba's School: Boarding school for 210 hearing-impaired, blind and developmentally disabled children. Project: Electrification of Kitchen.

Arise School - basic school for poor children in a needy area of Choma.

Chivuna: St. Joseph's School for Girls: Secondary boarding school serving over 700 girls. Project: water purification utilizing advanced technology. (During a recent cholera outbreak, this was the only school to remain open in Zambia as a result of the purified water system.)

Mutare: Herbal Centre for Natural Medicine for HIV+/AIDS patients: this is one section of an integrated Community Care Programme

Personnel Projects: Hospice care/counselling, Hospice outreach programmes, Herbal Project development, teaching, nursing, monitoring of local projects, capacity-building of the Regions

Hope for the Future

The SHM Extended Family Board of the West America Province is excited to share with you some inspiring news from this year's 10th annual RSHM International Network of Schools Conference.

From June 27 - July 2, 2009 the RSHM International Network of Schools Conference, hosted by Colégio de Nossa Senhora do Rosário, in Porto, Portugal, provided the first annual student summit. The summit offered an opportunity for twenty-eight students, representing fourteen RSHM schools from all over the world, to come together and share ways their schools implement the RSHM mission, "To know and love God. To make God known and loved. To proclaim that Jesus Christ has come in order that all may have life."

These twenty-eight young people have confirmed for all of us that the RSHM mission is alive and thriving among 16,000 young people attending RSHM schools all over the world. The following are brief extracts by some of the students, expressing their experiences in Portugal:

The overwhelming sense of a greater community larger than ever imagined struck me most when I met other students like myself from across the world. The RSHM global community truly came to life. We all arrived unsure of what was in store for us: what we would do and what the other students would be like. We spent five days together sharing cultures, touring cities, building leadership skills, learning of our responsibility to the RSHM in the future, sharing experiences from our own schools, playing with underprivileged kids, and struggling to get by not knowing any Portuguese. Surprisingly enough, for all of us, our similarities and differences harmonized to create a cohesive group that by the end of the week had established life-long friendships. It was an experience none of us will forget and though we left with tears



in our eyes fearing that we will never see each other again, we know that we are together, no matter how far apart, we are together in Marymount. (Luisa de Carteret, Marymount High School, Los Angeles)

We were able to work on an all day community service project, called Projecto Raiz, helping underprivileged children re-paint a mural. After, we all went to the park

and got to interact with all the children. We enjoyed fun games, delicious food and sang songs we will never forget. For me, that was one of the most memorable events of the trip. I truly enjoyed sharing in the works of the RSHM. I imagine that the joy and satisfaction that I felt when helping at Projecto was the same that was felt by Fr. Gailhac when he served the women and children in Béziers. This day gave us the opportunity "To know and love God. To make God known and loved."
