## Ministry in the Bon Pasteur Caring Centre, Bèziers, France : Dorothy Ward



I joined the Bon Pasteur community, Bèziers in March 2002. I was just another member of the community but had responsibility for the health of the sisters there. As all the sisters were elderly 85-99 it was obvious that they had varying needs physically and spiritually. It was important for me to treat them peacefully and respectfully as they prepared for the latter part of life.

I thought it was important that, as sisters of the Sacred Heart of Mary, they felt that they still belonged fully to the Institute and had a ministry at this stage of their lives. I liked to keep them up to date with the news and ask them to pray for various intentions. Older people can have a great ministry praying for the needs of others.

Although for many years of my life I had nursed people who were dying I found it more difficult to nurse my own religious sisters – especially when it came to funerals – because there was a special relationship there. These were my sisters in a true sense. We were in the same community and had a deep spiritual and human bond. Seven of my sisters died while I was there from March 2002 to October 2008. I feel very blessed to have had this experience of ministry.



## Pastoral Ministry in the Caring Centre, Liverpool: Kathleen O'Donovan



For the past ten years Kathleen's ministry has been taking care of our elderly and sick sisters in Arrowsmith House in Liverpool. She says that for her what is really important is expressed in their Mission Statement:
