Talk given by Sr. Mary Murray before the Requiem Mass for Sr. Therese R.I.P on Friday the 8th of September 2017

Therese was born near New Inn, County Tipperary on July 10th, 1920. She was the only one of her siblings to be born there as her four sisters and three brothers were blessed to be born in the North of Ireland! Therese always saw herself as a Tipperary woman. Her parents sent her to Ferrybank as a boarder when she was fourteen in 1934. Four years later she entered the newly opened Novitiate in Ferrybank.

Therese, as a Religious of the Sacred Heart of Mary was first and foremost a person totally dedicated to God and God's will for her. The love of Christ compelled her and enabled her to:

- Accept all the calls she heard and followed in Ferrybank from her entry into the Community in 1938 until 1975, first in the day school and in the amalgamated school of boarders and day girls and as coordinator of the local community (1968-1975) just at the time when Vatican 11 was in the air. She was very open to the call to renewal without getting side-tracked by superficial changes.
- The love of Christ enabled her to leave Ferrybank in 1975 and go to Tallaght where she was appointed Formation Directress and also taught in our school in Roslyn. That same love enabled her to make the a very radical change in her early 60's to go to Zambia for ten years to share in the RSHM mission there, helping in the formation of the young Zambian sisters and engaging in spiritual direction.
- That same love brought her first back to Tallaght and then to the new community of Castleoaks in Ferrybank where she involved herself as best she could in the local Parish community and on the boards of the Primary School and the Convent Secondary. She gave much help to the negotiations that led to establishing of Abbey Community College and served on its Board for several years.
- As her capacity to walk declined, she accepted gracefully to go to Madonna House and received gratefully the care she needed. The loss of one's independence is difficult for everyone and Therese found it so but she always said that she realised how much she had to be thankful for and she tried each day to show her appreciation to all who looked after her. I know that her quiet accepting presence will be sadly missed by all who live and work there.

She loved her family very much and spoke of you all with great warmth and affection. She had so many nieces and nephews and grand nieces and nephews that it was hard to keep up with who was who.

She also cared very much for all the past pupils that she kept in contact with over the years. She had a great rapport with the Ferrybank and Dublin past pupils when they were active and with Past Pupils who always contacted at Christmas.

As a person Therese was graced with a firm, steady temperament quiet free from mood swings personality which made her and easy to live with person. she had the gifts of understanding and compassion for people and at the same time was not afraid to be direct and clear thinking in her approach when the situation required. She enjoyed repartee as the carers know and had an impish sense of humour which manifested itself especially when she played Scrabble and took a gleeful delight in triple scores.

You may know that Therese and I have been good friends since I came to Ferrybank in 1968 as a still very green and shaky religious, not yet finally professed and still trying to find my vocation as a religious. Therese was both exemplar and mentor – a soul friend, an anam cara as the Irish says.

People who help fashion our life in a positive and constructive way are gifts to us and I believe that all of us who knew Therese would agree that she was a gift to us in Madonna, to the RSHM Community, to the church and to those who came in contact with her. There is much more I could say but Therese would not wish too much speech so I will end with these encouraging words from "Benedictus"

"May you, Therese, continue to inspire us To enter each day with a generous heart To serve the call of courage and love Until we see your beautiful face again In that land in which there is no separation Where all tears will be wiped from our mind And where we will never lose you again." (John O' Donoghue) "May the two arms of Christ enfold her and my she rest in God's Paradise of Grace" (Ag Criost an Siol) The Madonna House Community wishes to thank all who looked after Therese in such a caring way, all who

came to her funeral and those who sent mass cards and condolences to the community.

70TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE OPENING OF ROSLYN PARK

It all began for me when Sr Martin Murray sent me a copy of a letter from Joan Stearn (from my time) inviting people to the Celebration of the 70th Anniversary of the opening of Roslyn Park, September 1947 and to reactivate the Past Pupils reunion.

Another step for me happened in our Cemetery on the 8th of September after we had laid Sr Therese RIP to rest. Groups stood chatting, remembering, recalling. Someone addressed the person beside me "Catherine, you would remember that" and suddenly the penny dropped for me and I asked the said Catherine" Are you Catherine O'Carroll?" She said "Yes. and who are you?" "I'm Teresina", and suddenly we were back to 1948 when I started my teaching career in Roslyn Park and Catherine was in what we called Kindergarten 2. Memories! Later she told me "When you said Teresina, I immediately recalled Oh the Mother who taught us after Santa Claus!" (the name they had for Betty who was Sr Stanislaus at that time). We then proceeded to Madonna House to become reacquainted with our 97-year-old Santa Claus.

Next day. Saturday 9th Sept I went to Drumcondra and Patricia, Anne Kavanagh and myself set out for the Celebration at the Talbot Hotel Stillorgan. The drinks reception started at 7pm followed by dinner at 8pm. There were already 300 past pupils around, including a few men (not from my time) Names became familiar as they came to meet us. I could go on for a week as they stirred up so many memories-Mabette, Elizabeth, Pauline, the Tanhams etc. and they explained their then and now names.

- Entering the dining room, the tables were arranged according to the year people attended school 56, 60, 75, 80 etc., so they dined with the year group of finishing school.
- We were told we did not need name badges as we were on Table 1! As the evening wore on and more and more people came to talk more and more memories were stirred up as people asked for Mother so and so of that time. Memories of First Communions in Star of the Sea were recalled. They remember us making books for the them and when they went to bed their parents enjoyed praying/reading them. Does anyone remember the books?
- On October 5th Catherine, Pauline Curran and Joan Stearn came to visit us in Ferrybank just to continue the conversation.
- Some people won't know the latest of Roslyn. REHAB Ireland have worked there very successfully since the 80s. Last year they sold to the State but leased it back for 2 years while they got their all-in-one premises built (Roslyn is on 3 sites) town houses, apartments etc.

REFLECTION CHINA SEPTEMBER 2017

In early 2017 I received a call from China to return there. It took some time to see how this could become a reality. It was

important to discern and listen to the voices around me from 'Yes, Go, keep the Relationship going', to 'Mind your health', Ageism and the quiet voice of Blessing!

This China outreach came originally through All Hallows. The overall responsibility and organization remains with Fr. Hugh O'Donnell CM (83) Vincentian Chinese/Taiwan Province. Hugh is well known to Priests and Sisters throughout China. He organizes for them an annual month's Leadership Program in De Paul University, Chicago.

I am very happy to arrange and share with you 'A Time to tell the Story' of my recent time in China. In the meantime, these images, maps and reflection will give a flavor of my journey.





On arrival, the Sisters of St. Joseph, at the North Church in Beijing were my base. This Congregation was founded by a French Vincentian, Monsignor De a Place, late 19th century. It dispersed during the was

founded in 1988. They are diocesan and their ministry at various levels is

Cultural Revolution and was remainly with The North Church, The South Church and the East Church in Beijing and outreaches form these. The sisters strike me as being a very hard working group. I moved out from St. Joseph's and returned there three times in September. It was a place of refreshment and solace. My first journey from Beijing took me 90Km South East, by 'Super Train' to Tianjin, to the Sisters of Charity. I had the opportunity on three previous occasions to be with them, to share their life and ministries. This time, I also had the experience not only of Formation, Religious Life, but also of Leaven for Mission. My belief is that we receive in order to pass on. We worked well together for four days. These Sisters have a special place in my heart. They were founded by a Vincentian after the Cultural Revolution, they work with Lepers in remote areas, youth, Chinese Medicine, the poor elderly who have neither relatives nor finance, and they run a home for

12 elderly people. In all of these ministries they are dependent on donations.

Having returned to Beijing and rested for two days, the second journey was from Beijing 440 Km South to Handan, to the Sisters of The Consolation of the Holy Spirit. This was for an eight-day retreat with Fr. Hugh and me. Eleven of the twenty-five sisters were preparing to make/renew their temporary vows immediately after the retreat. I was very impressed by their prayer, silence, music and singing during the retreat. Their ministry is mostly with medical/ Chinese medicine, catechetics, youth and summer camps for small children. Twenty of the sisters work in the diocesan hospital.







GLOBAL NETWORK OF RSHM SCHOOLS

It was in a spirit of immense joy and excitement that 69 participants gathered in Bogota Colombia for the Inaugural Conference of the Global Network of RSHM Schools in June 2017.



It was only two years since our inception as a Global Network and to have achieved so much in that time is due to Sr. Roz's vision and commitment to the network and our own Sr. Philippa's support and encouragement, along with the work of the coordinating committee, as we strove to articulate a Mission Statement, Terms of Reference and Prayer for the Network. The Conference participants came from all our Provinces and Regions and the schools founded by us - Eastern and Western America; Brazil, Portugal, Zambezi and just me from the NEP. We received a tremendously warm and vivacious welcome from our Colombian Marymount Schools.

Roz set the tone with a wonderfully inspiring talk for which she received a standing ovation. Her presence there was tremendously-encouraging for all. Speakers came from Colombia, and from the coordinating committee and spoke to us of the importance of education in leading and preparing young people for a global world, according to the values of justice and peace.

One speaker really challenged us, Fr, Jose Leonardo Rincon SJ, Dean of the Faculty of Education and president of the Jesuit Schools in Colombia. He spoke of the 'theology of leadership' and identified 14 attributes of God in relation to leadership. It was just superb and if anyone would like a copy of my notes I would be more than happy to share them.

The liturgy, the sharing, the input, the discussion and the amazing food, as well as some 'carnival' experiences, really made our Conference an occasion of joy and great pride in being associated with our RSHM schools. The link to the conference website is :

NEWS FROM BRAZIL

Misean Cara spent two weeks in Brazil during September. Seamus Collins, who worked with Trocaire for many years, had the task of monitoring the projects while Christian, who is a recent employee of Misean Cara is assigned to the role of mentor in South America. He came on an experiential visit to learn about the Brazilian reality and methodologies used in the implementation of projects. We, RSHM, have five projects in Brazil, two being run by our Brazilian sisters in the state of Bahia and three in Joao Pessoa, Paraiba where we served for many years. Just a flavour of one of the projects :

LIGHT OF THE WORLD NURSEY in Mangabeira, Joao Pessoa, takes care of children between three months and six years. The nursery opens at 6:30 each morning including Saturday. The 42 children are from very poor and



extremely dysfunctional families where domestic violence and drug addiction are the norm. The project is selective because it attends families who have a desire to change their life style by working, studying or both. The project depends on community health agents to recommend families who are likely to avail of the services offered by the project. Each family pays a small monthly fee which contributes to the smooth running of the project. The fee is not fixed but is agreed with parents or guardian according to the circumstances of each one. The project has eight staff members who are fortunate to have a fixed salary with all their legal workers 'rights which is rare for nursery staff. The families of all eight staff depend on the nursery salary for survival. The impact of the project on the lives of children, staff and families is remarkable, the most prominent being undernourished, aggressive, unhappy children becoming sociable, friendly, mannerly and happy. Parents/guardians have a complete life change both within the family and in the community. They take greater care of their children, are less violent and aspire to become worthy citizens with a desire to change their circumstances and offer a better future to their children. Kate Nolan

IN MEMORY OF DOM JOSE MARIA PIRES

One of the reasons we chose to go to Joao Pessoa, in the Archdiocese of Paraiba, was because Maria de Lourdes Machado and others who were advising us told us that it was a diocese where we would receive help to insert ourselves into the lives of the poor, as there was a good pastoral structure under the guidance of the Bishop, Dom Jose. Dom Jose was the first black Bishop in Brazil, appointed in September 1957 and then, during the II Vatican Council, sent as archbishop to Paraiba, a neighbor to Dom Helder Camara. He was warned by some not to follow the ways of Dom Helder, who was called a communist. From then on, they were firm friends, both committed to doing all they could to encourage the poor to fight for their rights and to work for democracy, supported by the framework of the Basic Christian Communities in the dioceses of the north East. Dom Jose walked every day from his house to the curia offices in flip-flops, talking to the young street workers, earning their living by 'minding' cars, and others he met on the way. We could go to his house, knock on the door and go in to talk to him without ceremony. He was a prophet for our times, in his simplicity and his defense of the poor and oppressed. In our early years in Joao Pessoa he closed the cathedral to celebrate the Christmas midnight Mass in the square in front of the Governor's Palace, where families who had been put off their land with violence were camped under black plastic sheeting, as a protest, hoping to gain the right to return to their homes. Dom Jose started the first Human Rights center in Brazil, to give legal support to any who were treated unjustly and to help organize the poor to fight for their rights. When Mary came back from doing the ISL course and had nowhere to attend clients, Dom Jose allowed her to use his office in the curia.

Dom Jose died on 27th August this year. The date was one more thing he shared with Dom Helder who had died in 1999 on that day. It was also the anniversary on the death of Dom Luciano Mendes, another Brazilian Bishop with the same commitment to the poor. One writer from Paraiba said "This date, when three great witnesses to the Love of God, who were courageous prophets at the service of the poor, should be known as the National Day of the Prophetic Voice, to remind us that the love of God comes through the defense of human rights and to help us to renew our commitment to the project of Jesus of Nazareth, so that the day of liberation of the poor, which they dreamed of and for which they worked tirelessly, will come quickly."

Dom Jose was 98 when he died. I was fortunate to have visited him when in Belo Horizonte in January at the JPIC meeting. A week after his death we received in the post (which takes a long time from Brazil) an invitation to the mass and celebration marking his 60 years as a Bishop.

From Mary Jo McElroy, on behalf of the RSHM who lived in
