RSHM'S FOND FAREWELL TO KINGSTON



In 1955 the first sisters from the EAP came to the Coombe Estate in Kingston, Surrey and Marymount set deep roots in this beautiful setting. Sixty-two years later, assured that the RSHM ethos and the vision of Gailhac is firmly cherished, with the school flourishing, student enrolment growing and the Administration of the school in strong lay leadership, the three present RSHM in resident, Sisters Michelle Phelan, Breda Shelly and Kathleen Connell, bid a fond and grateful farewell.

In its infancy the Main House was home to students from Marymount College, Tarrytown's Junior Year Abroad Program (JYAP) attending Universities in London. The

community also started a High School offering the American high school diploma. The Surrey location proved to be too distant from London for the JYAP but the high school prospered, additional facilities were added, and the boarding department grew. Even with its ongoing development the campus always maintained its beautiful spacious garden. In the early days the boarding facility accommodated children

from diplomatic families, international businesses, etc., and were mainly American. With the introduction of the International Baccalaureate (IB) the student population changed and students hail now from China, Japan, Russia, Germany, England and about 40 other countries as the IB is recognized as a University Entrance qualification worldwide.

It will be sad to leave the many wonderful people we met here - especially our colleagues in education and the countless friendships we have developed over the years and this beautiful, peaceful campus but God is calling us to other mountains where we will encounter Him anew. Our being here in England has offered us many international experiences which have enriched our lives. We have had the opportunity to meet sisters from other Provinces and Regions and to be open to other cultures. However, many new, rich and communal experiences will open up before us. This is not goodbye to Europe and friends but only farewell as world news, emails, twitter, facebook and skype will allow us stay in touch.

We give thanks that there are others to carry our work based on the examples and teaching we have shown while with them. Our prayer for each of us as we say au revoir echoes the words of Gailhac: May what God has begun in us live, grow and become ever more perfect.

FERRYBANK PAST PUPIL SETS UP A "NO OVERHEADS" CHARITY TO HELP UGANDAN SCHOOL CHILDREN



Ursula Flynn is a past pupil of the Sacred Heart of Mary Secondary School in Ferrybank, Waterford where she attended school during the years1961 to 1967. Ursula and Harry took a trip to Uganda with World Vision Ireland in October 2015 to see the type of projects they were involved in and were so moved by the plight of the rural dwellers there that they went back out to Tiira Village, Eastern Uganda, not far from the border town of Busia in April 2016 and selected 20 families with 70 school-going children between them to support. They purchased mattresses and blankets locally and distributed them to the families before they returned home. They put structures in place with local volunteers to distribute food to the 8 destitute families included. They also made arrangements to send the 70 children to school, pay for the uniforms and exercise books

as well as to supply a porridge lunch each day. Ursula and Harry Knox returned to Tiira Village in December 2016 and assessed more families to be supported. This resulted in a total of 35 families accepted with the school fees for their 112 school-going children for the 2017 school year being paid. They returned again in November 2017 to oversee the finances and to check the progress of the children. They accepted another 25 families into the project and now over 200 children at both primary and secondary level will have their school fees paid for 2018.

While all of this was going on, in a parallel process the paperwork was being completed to ensure that Opportunity Knox Charity would be registered with the Charities Regulator and with Revenue. The Registered Charity Number 20106164 and the Revenue Chy Number 21754 were all given by February 2017. A website opportunityknox.ie was created and all official documents relating to the Charity as well as a record of the work

and finances of the Charity can be examined there. 2016 was a difficult time for charities in Ireland, withdrawing it fully from the many charities operating in the Country- In an effort to get people to support the Charity Ursula and Harry came up with the idea of a "No Overheads" Charity as a means to attract donors.

This involves Ursula and Harry donating sufficient funds to cover all administrative and personal expenses and so guaranteeing that 100% of any donation from a member of the public would be used directly to pay school fees as well as a blanket and a mattress (where needed) for the school children. The families chosen are the poorest of the poor families in Tiira Village. Most live in mud huts with grass roofs and the children lie on a sack on a floor made from a cow dung mixture. Now the children have a comfortable night's sleep and go to school with the necessary copies and wearing their uniform as well as having a porridge lunch each day. Opportunity Knox has also built a colourful playground in Tiira Village for all the children who live in the village and surrounding area.

The Charity was launched in Ursula and Harry's home parish of Kilmacow in April 2017 and has been generously supported by relatives, friends, neighbours, and fellow parishioners. Harry and Ursula donated 23,500 Euro during the first year and received public donations of 6,500 Euro. This is a 5 to 7-year project and the founders hope to donate 10,000 Euro per year for the next 5 years to cover all costs and to obtain 10,000 to 15,000 Euro in public donations in order to meet their target of providing 5 years' education for 200 or more children. Gold-mining is very evident in Tiira Village and often, until now, children have had to get involved in that dangerous and unhealthy activity in order to find money for their fees and school books. Now several boys who had left school for a life of gold mining have returned to school and they stay away from mining.

MINISTRY ON MERSEYSIDE

For the last seventeen years I have worked with people with disability. In the year 2000 when I came to Liverpool a chance encounter with a man in a wheelchair led me in that direction. Patrick had lived in Belmont Park, Ferrybank for seven years and he was then living with the Brothers of Charity in Thingwall, Liverpool. Working at Thingwall for one and a half years was one of the most satisfying work experiences because of the variety of activities we planned and participated in.



Nugent Care, the Archdiocesan Charity, advertised for a Catechist for children with disability. I visited families in their homes and children in their special schools. As well as sacramental preparation, with the help of volunteers, we try to offer ongoing formation to young people in the form of Reflection Days and Retreat/self-catering holidays in Penmaenmawr. We have monthly meetings of Faith & Light, a sister

group of L'Arche. Belonging to this international group widens our circle of friends in the North East & West of England. We visit different communities every year, go on pilgrimages and holidays. We also have weekly social groups/clubs. Sr. Anne O'Connell was involved with these in1960s. We reminisced with her about her involvement when seventeen of us visited the community. We were in Barrow for the ordination of a Deacon.

Fundraising for the Good Shepherd Fund and preparing Masses in the north & south of the diocese opened up opportunities to visit the many primary and secondary schools in the Archdiocese each year. It is always encouraging to meet past pupils of Seafield in the various schools. As recently as this week the head teacher of the primary school choir singing in our Advent Carol Service told me she went to school in Seafield.

Linking with catechists from other dioceses gave rise to 'The Living Fully' Conference in Rome in 2016. This was a fully inclusive gathering with two

streams, one practical and experiential programme and the other academic. Both groups shared prayer in the morning and evening and coffee breaks and lunch. Eight of us attended including five of our friends. We enjoyed the hospitality of the Generalate community.

In response to the Jubilee of Mercy in 2016 another conference was held in Rome "Catechesis & Persons with Disabilities" This gathering attempted to demonstrate that our church is inclusive and ready to listen and learn from people with disabilities. At local level a lot of work still needs to be done. A group of French Contemplative Sisters with and without Downs Syndrome gave a moving account of their foundation. It was a blessing that Pope Francis met every single delegate, 420 including over 100 deaf people from different countries. Throughout the conference there was a real sense of "no them and us, only US". We are now planning to take an active part in the Eucharistic Congress in Liverpool 2018. The last seventeen years have been life giving for me. For this I am grateful.

JUBILEE JOY FOR CASTLEMILK



The good people of Castlemilk had much to celebrate last month as the parish of St Margaret Mary's celebrated its diamond jubilee. Archbishop Tartaglia offered a Mass of Thanksgiving for the 60th Anniversary of the Parish and Church of St Margaret Mary which is a well-known landmark at the top of the hill leading through the large housing estate. Addressing the large congregation, the Archbishop confessed the area had not been familiar to him until recently. He said: "Before I was Archbishop, I had rarely ever been in Castlemilk or to St Margaret Mary's. Since becoming Archbishop, I have been here a good few times now. I have always enjoyed coming among you...'

The sense of enjoyment was shared by parishioners, old and new who gathered to mark a major milestone for the community which has changed dramatically over the last six decades. Archbishop Tartaglia said: "Erected as it was

in the late 1950's when Castlemilk was a developing housing estate with a very numerous population, an imposing building as it is, situated very close to the main road through Castlemilk, St Margaret Mary's Church has always been a landmark in Castlemilk. And that landmark said: God is among us, God is near us, God loves us, welcome to the house of God. "And this remains the purpose of St Margaret Mary's Church in this community — to be a sign of God's presence and nearness and of his love for his creatures. Even in these days, when people seem to want God less but really need Him more, this Church continues to say: God loves you and welcomes you".
