

"Our discussion was around number 2 of the provincial chapter statement, i.e. the plight of the poor, homeless, refugees and asylum seekers. We were encouraged by the input of the members of the group, to think creatively and decide in what way we can contribute to the alleviation of the problems these groups of people have when they hear of the influx of migrants from other parts of the world. The response of many is very negative. The media does not always encourage us to have an attitude of welcome to the stranger. In fact, there is often a resistance to any new-comers. We hope and pray that we will have an attitude of welcome to those in need. Members of the group suggested practical ways of helping those in need. There are many projects in the Liverpool area already which are caring for the needy. We hope to reconnect with Saint James's, Bootle, where the first RSHM's worked, and direct some of our help there. The suggestion is to work in cooperation with the parish school. This is in addition to all the work that Kathleen and Eleanor are already doing in their parish ministries. We are exploring what we can do locally". "We reflected on the Provincial Chapter mandate pointing to the General Chapter, focused on the term, 'threshold', defined as a point at which a stimulus begins to bring a response, or to quote the Christmas letter, 'threshold' as 'a defining moment'. Integrating these terms into the Provincial Chapter statement the stimulus we will seek will be studying the Call to Holiness, Pope Francis. Hopefully enriched/gifted with a sense of generosity and compassion to continue our mission as spelled out in Nos 2,3, and 4, continuing our networking, pastoral support and sharing. We are conscious of our need of prayer to respond with joy, and with hope to rise above the demands which current changes and inconveniences may make on us and move forward with hope".

On February 2nd the sisters in Béziers, Marie Jean, Marie Paule, Christiane, Bernadette, Lucienne, Thérèse-Marie and Françoise, met to discuss and share on the implementation of the provincial chapter mandate.

We have had the opportunity to quote and work on passages of letters and encyclicals of Pope Francis in meetings such as interpersonal relations, patient support, extended family, sharing groups and especially paragraphs concerning justice, peace, the call to holiness and joy.

We try to be attentive to the option for the poor, the care of the earth, and justice by participating in actions by internet or actions organized in the city. For example: by informing and supporting the



International Association "Zonta" by mobilizing people to say "NO" to violence against women with very strong testimonials, financial support and actions in different villages.

The Jean Gailhac House (Children's House) invited us to participate in a day that brought together associations of child protection of the Hérault: exhibition of children's works, a conference motioned on "Zatypies" with the participation of different people: the gifted, the autistic, the

hyperactive etc. and the sharing of a meal prepared by young people.

We are in contact with immigrant women through the association "Point d'Appui" which offers French language training. We welcome the Good Shepherd Gladys, from Venezuela, and support Arjana, a young woman who came from Albania in 2016 with her eleven-year-old daughter Argita.



We try to be attentive to invite new people to the Extended Family and, thus, to energize the group and rejuvenate it!

We recognize that we need to move forward in mutual accountability in order to improve the quality of our lives and become more free and joyful and look to the future with confidence!

We had our first Community meeting re Chapter commitments recently. We choose Pope Francis Laudato Si to guide our reflections. In this meeting we focused on "Finding God in a Leaf" from Brian Grogan's, S.J., commentary on the Pope's letter. Brian uses a mystical approach which we agreed calls us to a "Transformation of the Heart" in our efforts to grow towards a deeper understanding leading to action in caring for the earth "Our Common Home". We began by praying the prayer of St. Francis, "Brother Sun and Sister Moon", from where comes the words "Laudato Si". This led us into a sharing that was open, honest and inspiring. We plan to continue this journey of allowing "Laudato Si" to reveal its life-giving treasures to us.



Community Reflection 70, Drumcondra

Many are surprised to discover that cattle farming is a leading cause of deforestation in the Amazon. This land is often taken illegally from indigenous people. Meat production is a leading cause of greenhouse gas emissions. In fact, the average serving of meat represents many times the greenhouse gas emissions of the average serving of fruits, vegetables, and grains.

The Society of African Missions (SMA) in partnership with the Irish Tree Council is offering you a unique opportunity to join the fight to combat the impact of Global Warming and Climate Breakdown. **It is called The Laudato Tree and Great Green Wall Project.** The SMA, through its Laudato Tree Project, have developed a unique project that aims to grow trees in Ireland and to support Africa in delivering the Great Green Wall by 2030. The Great Green Wall will be a Forest of trees planted against climate change running across the Sahel region. It will be an 8000 km new world wonder, crossing the entire width of Africa and 15 kms in width running until 2030. It will transform lives and the environment, extending from Senegal in the west to Djibouti in the east. Donations of all sizes, large or small are welcome. Each €60 donated will cover the cost of planting one tree in woodland in Ireland and 5 trees on Africa's Great Green Wall. Any donation will also help to create green jobs, increase food security and train Great Green Wall guardian communities. The trees planted will also begin to extract up to 240 tons of carbon from the atmosphere during the next 50 years and so help in combating the impact of Global Warming. This means that everyone can get involved and make a difference in Ireland and along Africa's Great Green Wall. The Laudato Tree and the Great Green Wall Project was inaugurated by the President of Ireland, H.E. Michael D. Higgins, in March 2018 for the SMA (Society of African Missions), and in the presence of the UNCCD and the Tree Council of Ireland. It was launched by the Minister for Communications, Climate Action and the Environment, Denis Naughten TD, on 8 August 2018, in Roscommon Town Park, Ireland. **Catherine Dunne**
