
Kathleen Nolan, Liverpool

Seafield Gathering in November 2009

On Sunday 29th November a group of about 20 from Crosby and Fazakerly gathered in Seafield. As Sr. Deirdre and our friends from Fazakerley gathered there was a great buzz as old acquaintances were renewed. Sr. Patsy extended a warm welcome to everyone. Kath Nolan reported on a meeting of the Extended Family in Pen after which we met to see what we might do in November. It was felt that there had to be a purpose in our gathering. Previously we had told our story and shared topics of interest. With Kath's fundraising experience we decided to ask the Zambezi Province to name a project we might support and they suggested we could help two small projects in Mutare. Kath led a prayer and this was followed by two friends sharing their experience of Zimbabwe.

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Gertrude Chikura, is a Zimbabwean trained in the hospital in Chikonohono where we had our Novitiate. Gertrude is always amazed at our willingness to help her people. She spoke graciously about the Missionaries who enabled her and her family to get a good education. It was always the ambition of young Zimbabweans, she said, to do well at school but unfortunately with the current political situation very few young people benefit from secondary school education. She broke down as she spoke about how AIDS has devastated her fellow country people. She was the first to donate to the fund for Mutare.



Lorraine Brown gave a brief overview of her voluntary work with MRANG a group of women seeking asylum in Liverpool, most of whom have been raped in their country of origin. Fr. Peter Morgan met some of these women in the Maternity Hospital in Liverpool where he is chaplain and saw how they struggled as they gave birth alone in a foreign country and found it extremely difficult to bond with their babies. MRANG provides birth partners for the women, gives them all they need for themselves and their babies while in hospital and welcomes them twice a week to meet in St. Patrick's Hall, Toxteth. Lorraine keeps Fridays free so that she can accompany the women to Detention Centres, Court or the hospital. Nugent Care is now assisting MRANG with policies and procedures, Financial and Management matters.

Questions and discussion followed. Sr. Nuala prepared a welcome cup of tea and refreshments. The community at Seafield were happy to have us meet there and we look forward to our next gathering.

researched and found to be beneficial to people who have different degrees of memory loss. The emphasis is on the sister completing the diary herself, with help where needed, so encouraging autonomy and independence.
