### HEARTS BURNING WITHIN US Myriam Bécourt:

A few months ago, Anna, a prisoner in the women's detention centre in Rennes, where I work as a chaplain, gave me the following text as a present. On her life's journey, marked by violence and despair, she experienced an encounter which changed her life and enabled her to make a fresh start. With her agreement I am sharing the text with you.

#### Statement

13 years ago, Lord, you called to yourself the person I loved most in the world. I was angry; I hated everybody. I lived a life of debauchery; I hurt innocent people.



I didn't hear you calling; I wanted only one thing: to meet again this person who is with you.

In 2009 I found myself in the coldest and most inhuman place possible. But you overlooked all that. I will always remember that day in 2009 when you came knocking at the door of my heart which was like the prison door. I looked through the spy hole and saw you, so pure and so holy. I opened the door to you and you came in, full of gentleness and infinite love. I was dead when you came but you raised me up to life again. You taught me how to live like a child once more; you healed the wounds of my heart. Thank you, Lord, for your kindness and mercy. You took away the bars and barbed wire imprisoning me and let me experience once again the joy of love and sharing, of life by your side.

Today I am ready to face the world because you are there to guide me and to lift me up when I fall. You alone can move mountains and put what is in disorder back into order.

I am writing these few words to you, Lord, to open my heart to you and thank you for all the blessings you give your children day by day.

*I will end by quoting these lines from Tim Guénard\* which are a testimony to love and hope.* 

"The Big Boss isn't waiting for us like a judge in court ready to pass sentence. When he comes into our hearts it's not like the police swooping down on us. He waits for us like a father. No matter what his children have done he still loves them."

Courage to all those who are imprisoned in the eyes of the world but free in the eyes of God.

### INTERVIEW WITH PAT PINSENT -READING ALOUD TO THOSE WITH DEMENTIA

Pat and Henry Pinsent have been regular visitors to Noddfa, normally taking part in Catholic People's Weeks. This article, from 'Living with dementia' magazine, February 2013, offers us ideas for helping those we know who have dementia.

#### **INTERVIEW WITH PAT PINSENT -READING ALOUD TO THOSE WITH DEMENTIA**

Some people with dementia may struggle with reading and interpreting text. Fiona Madden speaks to a carer who discovered a shared passion for books by reading aloud to her husband.

One of the things that 79-year old Pat Pinsent noticed about her husband Henry after his dementia diagnosis was that over time he had decreased levels of concentration and clarity when it came to reading. Pat cares for Henry, also aged 79, at their Norwich home. She decided to try reading aloud to him in an effort to engage and stimulate him and she has found it to be enlightening and enjoyable for both of them.



Pat says, 'I have a degree in English literature but my recent expertise has been in children's literature. I thought he'd enjoy many of the books and so was something worth doing, and I know reading is healthy for the mind.'

#### **Past connections**

Care was taken in choosing the first book as Pat wanted to pick something that not only kept Henry engaged but also related to some of his past experiences. She says, 'I got hold of this book called 'Hopping' by Melanie McGrath. I thought it would interest Henry because he kept on talking

about going on annual hop-picking visits to Kent when he was a child. 'Henry responded really well. He was born in the East End so he would remember places and that specific book brought experiences back to him. He offered comment on things like being evacuated. Sometimes I had to stop him to continue when he got carried away with talking, as he does!' Pat, who has been reading to Henry for the best part of a year, then selected children's books about the Second World War as her next two choices. This tied in with his experiences, especially of wartime child evacuation. She says Henry enjoyed both books thoroughly and was once again able to relate to the characters and empathise with their stories.

#### **Remembering stories**



Pat says that Henry found it much easier to follow storylines when each chapter was episodic and so didn't require him to remember the plot from day to day. 'I read to him every morning before breakfast, for the duration of a reasonable section of the book, usually a chapter or half a chapter. I start off by encouraging him to remember where we got to last time and reinforce that.' Pat comments that although he doesn't recall everything they have covered he has remembered some quite complicated information. For example, when she was reading him a book about a Viking

girl in 11th century Constantinople he always remembered that the Vikings had called the city Miklagard whenever they came back to the story. Henry, who was diagnosed with Alzheimer's three years ago, also enjoys attending the Society's local 'Singing for the Brain group'.

#### **Shared experience**


Although Henry still has the ability to read he struggles with certain aspects and with retaining information when doing it himself. Pat believes he may have had problems with reading even before the dementia diagnosis. She adds, 'He reads perfectly fluently now. He annoys me as we

drive along by reading out all the names of the roads and the car number plates in front! 'He reads perfectly well on a decoding level but not necessarily on a deeper level of assimilating what he's read into his knowledge or remembering it. He'll read the newspaper and come back to the same story and comment on it several times to me.' Pat has found that the experience of reading aloud to Henry has benefited them both and he has offered input as to what kind of books he would like to hear next. She says that she is not optimistic that he recalls many details about the stories but believes the shared experience is valuable.



Pat says, 'I do believe it's absolutely essential to choose a book that you both find interesting. To read something you don't like would be self- defeating.'

- 1. Turn your thermostat down by two degrees.

The following are extracts from a letter sent from TRAC to all member congregations:

... " Announcing that we are still on TRAC working to end Sex Trafficking.

We are re-launching TRAC as an independent, inter-congregational initiative (and not part of the Medaille Trust) TRAC is eager to continue to educate, raise awareness and campaign more effectively on the issue of sex-trafficking and on demand: the engine driving this international criminal practice. We are motivated by Isaiah's vision: 58:6 "To release the bonds of wickedness..." and by the mission of Jesus...Luke 4:18 "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me..."

We ask for your ongoing prayers as we re-launch our group to continue this important work."

We continue with our commitment to pray weekly on a chosen day for trafficked persons. We are included in the TRAC Rota which has nine congregations and many individual communities.

# Extract from the SPECTATOR: 2<sup>nd</sup> February 2013

"Why even Amsterdam doesn't want legal brothels. The Dutch experiment in legalised prostitution has been a disaster.

Twelve years ago the idea in Holland was to make prostitution a job like any other.....Once the women were liberated from the underworld, the crooks, drug dealers and people traffickers would drift away. Twelve years on...we can see the result of this experiment. Rather than afford better protection for the women, it has simply increased the market.

Pimps under legislation have been reclassified as managers and businessmen....Whether a town/city wanted brothels or not by legislation they HAD to have at least one; not doing so is contrary to the basic federal right to work.....

Nowhere in the world is street prostitution legal...because people do not want it in plain sight. The day after the Amsterdam zone opened, over 100 residents from nearby neighbourhoods took to the streets in protest. It took six years for the mayor to admit in public that the experiment had been a disaster, a magnet for trafficked women, drug dealers and underage girls. Zones in Rotterdam, The Hague and Heerlen have shut down in similar circumstances. The way ahead: Legislation will be repealed......"
