Meditation for Autumn or the End of the Year

He is the living stone, rejected by human beings but chosen by God and precious to him; set yourself close to him so that you, too, may be living stones making a spiritual house as a holy priesthood to offer the spiritual sacrifices made acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. As scripture says: Now I am laying a stone in Zion, a chosen precious cornerstone and no one who relies on this will be brought to disgrace. (1 Peter)

Reading (1 Corinthians): After all, we do share in God's work: you are God's farm, God's building. By the grace of God which was given to me, I laid the foundations like a trained master builder, and someone else is building on them. Now each one must be careful how he does the building. For no one can lay down any other foundation than the one which is there already, namely Jesus Christ. On this foundation, different people may build in gold, silver, jewels, wood, hay or straw but each person's handiwork will be shown for what it is.

The Brick: The bricklayer laid a brick on the cement, then, with his trowel spread another layer and brick. The foundations grew, the building rose tall and strong, to shelter men. I thought of that brick buried in the darkness - no one sees it, but it accomplishes its task, and the other bricks need it. Lord, what difference does it make whether I am on the roof top or in the foundations of your building, as long as I stand faithfully in the right place?

Prayer (Paul to Ephesians 3 14-20): This is what we pray, kneeling before the Father, from whom every family, in heaven or on earth receives its true name. We ask God to give us power through his Spirit to be strong in our inner selves, and that Christ will make his home in our hearts through faith. May our roots and foundation be in love, so that we may, with all God's people, have the

strength to grasp the breadth and length, the height and depth of Christ's love, although it can never be fully known - and so be completely filled with the fullness of God. Glory be to him whose power, working in us, can do infinitely more than we can ask or imagine; glory to him from generation to generation in the Church and in Christ Jesus for ever and ever. Amen.

27 September – We were pleased to welcomed Sr Rosamond Blanchet RSHM General Superior and Sr Mary Genino General Councillor when they joined us for our time of worship in the chapel, this was followed by an informal chat between our guests and ourselves in front room. Sisters Roz and Mary talked about the how the vision has changed from mainly working in schools to the present day when much of their work is with the poor, the needy and the vulnerable throughout the world. We were then able to tell them what was happening in our area and how it affects each one of us. Giving thought to 'What does the RSHM Extended Family Mean to Me?' The evening concluded with a shared supper – a very enjoyable evening had by all.

A Quick Trip to Béziers

Everyone connected with the Extended Family will have heard about Béziers - birth place of the RSHM founder, Jean Gailhac, site of the Mother House and beautiful city at the southern end of the Canal du Midi.

So, when we realised that Sister Pierre (most passionate advocate for Béziers) was going to be there while we were in Lourdes at the end of August, it wasn't a difficult decision to arrange a visit.

Four of us stayed in Bon Pasteur for 24 hours. It's a peaceful haven in the city and within easy reach of all the 'must see' sights.

We managed to sneak into the ground floor of the Curé's home, walk down the beautiful boulevard in the centre, go to mass in the Sister's local parish and see the childhood home of Père Gailhac - if only from the outside. It was all even more picturesque than we expected.

Jacques, friend of the Sisters, gave us a fascinating tour of the church of St Aphrodise, which was where the young Jean Gailhac worshipped. It has been derelict for some time but is being restored and is now hosting concerts and some services. The Mother House was beautiful. There was filming going on to record the history of the building and the work of the order. It was sad to see a single Sister living there as caretaker, but there's lots of innovative thinking going on as to how to best use the house, whilst maintaining its significance.

On a superficial level, Béziers is a lovely city and well worth a visit, but staying with the Sisters and experiencing their great hospitality and company, certainly gave me some insight into why keeping that link with the past is so important. My advice would be "go and see for yourself" -- I'll certainly be returning!

Furness Extended Family Monthly Prayer Meetings

In February this year, the Furness EF managed to achieve one of the aims set at last year's Noddfa Gathering and began a series of monthly gatherings to pray with the Sisters. In fact, this had been a wish for much longer. Meetings are normally held on the first Monday of the month in the Convent on Abbey Road in Barrow. Numbers attending have been around 20 or so, and people from all of the church communities in the Barrow and Ulverston/Dalton parishes have come along to take part. Sr Pierre has been leading the sessions, which normally take a theme based on the close-by Marian feast day or upon discipleship and service in the charism of Fr Gailhac. Different forms of prayer have been used in the sessions held so far, with contemplation and silence being a common part of them all. People are now becoming more confident in sharing too.

Of course, it wouldn't be a family gathering without a cup of tea and some biscuits afterwards. It never surprises me how long people take to chat about this and that, sometimes building new friendships and sometimes coming up with good ideas for future sessions and activities.

These prayer meetings have given us a more frequent 'heartbeat' to our family gatherings in Furness. Previously, we were focused on the gatherings linked to the major events in the Institute's calendar – 3 or 4 a year. Hopefully this will draw us closer together and help us to spread knowledge of the Extended Family, the charism and work of the Institute and help the Extended Family to grow – both in numbers and the level of commitment of its members.

Our next meetings will be on Monday, 4th November and 5th December at 7 pm in the Convent. If you live in the Furness area and haven't been yet, do come along to one of these if you can. We look forward to welcoming you.

A Regional Gathering

At a recent Core Group meeting in Carlisle, the idea of a Regional Gathering of the Extended Family in the North West was discussed. Out of that came a proposal to get together members of the Carlisle, Furness and Liverpool Extended Families in a "central" location. Then, putting the gathering on the 12th November was mooted, linking it to the Founder's Birthday (13th November). Finally, it was just the topic and location to sort out.

The outcome of all this is that our first EF North-West Regional Meeting will be held in Lancaster on Saturday, 12th November, between 10:30am and 3:30pm, in the Lancaster Cathedral Parish Centre, Balmoral Road, Lancaster, LA1 3BT.

The topic chosen is "The Integrity of Creation & Pope Francis's Laudato Si".

Lancaster was chosen because it is a reasonable distance for EF members to travel from their home base, the day can be a pilgrimage to the Cathedral, with an opportunity to attend Mass and to enter through the 'Door of Mercy' on the day before it closes on the 13th November for the end of the Year of Mercy and it has suitable venues to host a sizeable gathering.
