Sister Gabrielle O'Regan RSHM

Sister Gabrielle O'Regan, a native of Kinsale, died on December 28, 2016, in Madonna House, Ferrybank, Waterford. Our deepest sympathy goes out to her brother, Fr Liam and to her nieces, nephews, of whom she was very proud. Gabrielle- Maura, to her family, was the third of seven children.



She was always very close to her family and them to her. Growing up in that lovely town by the sea, the boats and regatta were all home to her. Listening to her stories you felt you were there and knew it all yourself. She attended the local Mercy Convent Primary School in Kinsale, and later moved to the SHM Convent in Ferrybank for her secondary education.

Leaving home for boarding school was a great wrench but, gradually, she settled into life. Maura stood out as a born leader with a mind of her own, always friendly and approachable. Her sense of fun and hearty laugh were infectious. She loved life and enjoyed it. She was also a very caring young girl, quick to notice anyone else in trouble, and help she did.

Having completed secondary education, felt the call to religious life. Her faith, always deep, helped her to make her commitment and so, in October 1947, she left home to join the Sacred Heart of Mary Sisters in Ferrybank. She did her novitiate training and then and then made her profession as a sister, taking the name Gabrielle. She trained as a teacher in Dublin and became a member of staff at the SHM School in Sandymount, Dublin, where her teaching ability and care for the children were very much appreciated by the staff and parents alike. But Sandymount had to lose her to Liverpool where she was missioned to take on the headship of a parish school caring for children and their parents as well as her staff.

After Liverpool, her next ministry was to Carlisle in the North of England. Here she became superior of the community for the next six years. Her next move was to London as a member of the Provincial Council - assisting the Provincial superior. Gabrielle, herself, was then appointed Provincial Superior and when that term of office was completed, instead of resting on her oars, she went to train in spiritual direction.

She always wanted to give herself to helping others, whether it was the lonely, the elderly or the destitute on the streets of Dublin - cooking dinners for those who had none, or helping others on their spiritual journeys through life. To her, everyone was a brother or sister. She was a great carer, with a very sensitive heart, who tried to fulfil her mission in the service of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Unfortunately, when some of her contemporaries were still able to work, Gabrielle's health began to deteriorate until eventually it became necessary for her to retire to the SHM Caring Centre at Ferrybank, where she was well cared for until she died peacefully just after Christmas 2016.

Gabrielle was pre-deceased by her parents, John and Margaret, and by her sisters Nan and Mairead, and her brothers Neil, FR Bertie and John. Her brother, Fr Liam, concelebrated a very moving, homely requiem amss for Gabriell, gathering into one all of the O'Regan family, relations and friends, as well as the Sacred Heart of Mary Sisters present and the Carers. And how fitting it was at the end of the burial service he said, "I think now she deserves a clap". So we all clapped. Alleluia!!

Update from Judith in Mexico

'Hola' from Guadalupe Community, Mexico. I am settling into my new surroundings slowly, slowly, as they say in Zambia, here in Mexico, despacito ,despacito! In many ways life here reminds me of Zambia so that

has been very helpful for me. The very high altitude here takes getting used to so I have to pace myself accordingly. It is now the winter season here but as I write this the sun is shining , lovely blue sky and temp. about 24°, not too bad for winter! It can get quite chilly in the evenings and mornings but I welcome that also.

So far so good all is going well here, gracias dios (thanks be to God) The three sisters here, Virginia, Fidelia and Julia are very kind and helpful and look after me well. I am getting used to the tortilla –our daily bread! lots of fresh fruit and a great variety of vegetables including Cactus which we had for dinner yesterday and it was very tasty.

The english classes are going well and my students are very enthusiastic. I take 2 sessions in the mornings and 2 in the afternoons so that keeps me busy along with preparation for classes. We also try to use as much english

as possible during meal times. My spanish vocabulary is also increasing, a bonus for me1

The Sisters here asked me to send good wishes and prayers to all of you in the province. They are very grateful that I have come to help them and are interested to hear about our province. They also ask for prayers for the

situation here with D.Trump as there is a lot of anxiety and uncertainty about.

That's all for now from Mexico. Thanks to all who have sent emails and texts, good to hear from you and feel connected. As I do not have a mexican sim card I cannot reply to the ordinary texts only to the *what's app* texts.

Greetings from Manor Park

As you know we have recently moved into our new home and are delighted to have arrived at last. We are particularly pleased about where we are situated because it has cut down on our travel time to Manor Park and we are also blessed with good transport links.

Each of us in the Community share in different ministries, Cafod, Women at the Well, SVP and Parish life, which bring us into contact with the vulnerable and the needy.



Parish Life

Our parish is mainly made up of Africans, Asians and a small group of Eastern Europeans, with a handful of English and Irish. Our numbers are large and as you can imagine we have a lot of young families. The work from day to day consists of visiting vulnerable families, the housebound and a Nursing Home. We are always aware that our main focus is to empower others to take leadership roles in the parish and to share responsibility for the various programmes such as R.C.I.A., Baptism and Confirmation etc. The deep faith and commitment of those who share in this work with us is a great encouragement and support.

The Diocese of Brentwood has involved every Parish in a programme to reflect on the way forward called, 'The Stewardship of the Gospel.' This involves looking at the parish, our resources, and how we can together build a stronger community in Manor Park.



At the moment we have a Housing Campaign going. This is an issue that affects a number of our parishioners. A group who have responsibility for bringing this forward are in contact with Newham Council, making them aware of the stories of bad housing, rogue landlords, high rents etc. We hope that these conversations will lead to change.

As a parish we are a member of London Citizens which challenges the Government on various issues.

Women at the Well

This is a drop in centre in King's Cross, dedicated to supporting vulnerable women.

We help women who;

- -are involved in street based prostitution
- -have problems with drugs and/or alcohol
- -are homeless-rough sleeping
- -are victims of sex trafficking
- -are offending or are involved in anti-social behavior

Staff and Volunteers work together to provide a creative and supportive space based on Gospel values,



empowering the women to make choices to improve the quality of their lives. Our new Outreach Team, work with the Police in supporting trafficked women, and this aspect of our work is being developed more.

We are open Monday to Friday each week, during which time the women who come to us can access the support they need for their individual needs, away from the chaos of their daily lives. We offer a welcoming environment, where people can relax, and feel accepted as they are. Hot food is served every day, shower and laundry facilities are available for those who are homeless. Other services available during the week are Counselling, Massage, Acupuncture, Reflexology, Manicures, which many of the women are happy to avail of. We encourage participation in activities - Arts and Crafts, Sewing, Gardening and Cookery, and these can be relaxing and enjoyable, taking the focus off their problems for a short time. Sitting at a meal, or joining in the activities, conversation and interaction taking place helps to build trust.

As a volunteer, I am privileged and blessed to have the opportunity to journey with the women who come to us. My eyes have been opened, and my heart touched, as they share their hardships, pain and rejection, calling forth compassion. It exposes me in a very real way to the struggles of those living on the margins of society today. Only last week one of our women told me she was hungry, she had not eaten for over 24 hours, since her meal with us the day before. Listening to her, raised my awareness of the many things I take for granted in my life. I thank God for the ways this ministry touches my life, and enables me live out our charism "that all may have life"
