Dear Sisters Pierre, Ann and Joyce,

This letter comes to you after hearing from Barrow of the eventual closing of the Convent of the Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Mary, later in September this year. This will come as a sad event; one which you three have been wondering about for some time now. I hope the closing will not bring too much upset, but it will give time to you and the local community to give thanks and praise for all that has gone before and now comes to fulfilment. I think that you must be thanked for being a strong praying presence within the changing community of Catholics in Barrow, in recent



years. You have carried on the long tradition of your Congregation and even when numbers have fallen and age creeps on us you have "fought the good fight". Your names join those famous sisters who built up the R.C. community of Barrow. My own family talk of happy memories of teaching sisters and headmistresses! I know that there will be so many more who

will join you in thanksgiving to God and His Holy Mother for all that has been done and good examples given. I know myself that something did happen to me as an infant in your Prep. School, that left its mark to be

built on later in life ...how I can't say, but Thanks bit to God for it. For most people, these days, a kind of peacefulness and security seems to come with advancing years. But that is not really so for many religious men and women at this time. It seems to take longer for religious to reach a time of proper "retirement" and a place of quietness. Most religious keep going through thick and thin and this is a type of radical life-style that most would not associate with religious life. You are to be congratulated

sisters, for your contribution to Catholic Life in Barrow during 120 years or so. Carlisle is not too far away for maintaining a link with Crosslands pupils etc.

So sisters, I hope this doesn't sound like a sermon, it is just my thoughts at hearing the news this morning. I really hope there will be commemorative services and occasions to celebrate your contribution. You deserve it.



May you enjoy your new home (eventually). I'll let the bishop and others say their thanks etc. Do not forget to have a good rest when you can. Wishing you every blessing and peace.


FATHER GEORGE BEGLEY'S HOMILY AT JUDITH'S REQUIEM MASS

We gather this am to express our sympathy to Judith's sisters Rosaleen, Pam, Aideen, Marlene (who is in India and could not get home for the funeral), also to her nieces, nephews, the sacred Heart of Mary Sisters, her family, friends and colleagues. We also gather as a Christian Community to profess our faith in the risen Lord, because it is through that faith that each of us is promised eternal life and that's our hope and prayer for Judith today. Judith certainly took the motto 'Life to the full' to her heart. She had so many interests from teaching to walking, nature to travel and she certainly packed plenty into her life. Mt 25:31

Only 2 years ago we gathered in this very chapel to celebrate her jubilee with her and she was beaming. Judith loved the young and while she taught in England and Zambia, she really enjoyed teaching students recently in Mexico. In her early days she worked with the Aids Housing Fund where she was fondly known as Judy and that experience, along with the time she spent counselling in Domville House brought her vocation into sharp focus for her as she cared for the weak and vulnerable. I feel that because Judith didn't always have an easy life that she was able to

empathise with them and therefore was able to give them hope through her care and concern and she made many good friends while there. Judith loved to party and her kindness to others will never be forgotten. I know that she took part in the Croi Nua Programme, walked around Hartstown Park in training for the Camino, and returning to Zambia before her jubilee to meet up with friends and those she taught – 5 of the children she taught joined the seminary and some of

them became Bishops. A young Sr. Beatrice put it so well. On hearing of Judith's death, she texted — I will miss her smiling face and voice of encouragement. While Judith didn't always have life easy and I suppose nobody does, she moved out of her comfort zone in order to care for others. She put the Gospel into practice by doing her utmost to serve God and her neighbour. Today we gather to bid her a fond farewell — hoping that she is now at peace — reunited with her late brother Gabe, and I think especially of Helen and Regina and all who have travelled ahead of her on the pilgrim journey. May those of you who loved her find comfort through the kindness and support of friends at this time.



EXTRACT FROM A TRIBUTE TO ELIZABETH MCELROY AT HER FUNERAL 11TH JANUARY 2018

Sarah Elizabeth was born in Greencastle County Down on 25 February 1924 to Thomas and Mary, one of seven children: Henry, Phil, Vera, still living and Amelia, Cecilia and Patricia who are deceased. Henry has recollections of her being a bit of a tomboy when she was little, something she obviously grew out of. Her visits to her family were important to her and the family remember



her as being kind and helpful. Indeed, the words Henry and Home were frequently on her lips in her later days here in Arrowsmith. It is good to welcome today her niece Veronica, nephew Aidan and grandniece Laetitia.

Elizabeth was at school in the St Louis Convent and Belfast College of technology studying English, Geography and typing. And then the unexpected happened. She recalled how she was sitting at her typewriter and distinctly heard the words "Come Follow Me". The call was clear. It was a profound experience and she knew then what she had to do.

Elizabeth came to the RSHM Noviciate in Ferrybank in 1942 and after her first vows started her primary school teaching career, first in Seafield Prep and then, after college at Endlseigh Park Hull where she specialized in Art. She was in Rathmore and Lisburn for 17 years and we have here today Ursula who was taught by her then and Evelyn who was also in the community and teaching in Lisburn at that time. She came to Barrow in 1967 teaching in Chetwynde, Holy Family and St Mary's for a further 20 years. There are many sisters here who knew her from those days.

Elizabeth was always artistic and creative and loved nature. Many remember her wonderful classrooms "they were always a delight and up to date". Even today parents of the children she had in Barrow remember her very fondly and have sent messages and these flowers in appreciation.

Her creative talents are also remembered in the colorful garden that she tended in the Barrow community house. I remember well the brightly colored hanging flower baskets and boxes and am sure it is true. As one sister said, 'it has never been the same since'.

When she retired from teaching she engaged in various forms of pastoral work in Barrow, visiting the elderly, taking communion and especially accompanying people who were going through difficult times. She seems to have been a sensitive listener and had a real aptitude for one to one relationships. Someone wrote of her I thank God for sending Elizabeth, she was like a grandmother to me, she helped me through the difficult years with her love, friendship, and kindness and brought me closer to the Lord she would kindly make me hot soup, a cuppa and cake and then we would have time to look at the bible and meditate on a passage.

In 2009 she began to develop Dementia and came to Arrowsmith. Someone who knew her soon after she came wrote: 'I wandered lonely as a cloud', like this line of Wordsworth, Elizabeth, although somewhat solitary was happy in her own world and in the beauty of nature. It was good to have spent time with her as she gave expression to her imagination in wonderful drawings of birds. She needed quiet and space, a sanctuary, her own sanctuary to do this and never grew tired of it. BARBARA BAILEY

The Zimbabwe Head of Christian Denominations and the Catholic Bishops Conference have issued a statement to unite and call upon all good willing people to take up their responsibilities. More involvement is needed to restore Zimbabwe to its former glory and to move forward for the good of all the people. The openness and expectation which have characterized these past few months will hopefully result in real reform on every level.
