
THE HOPE OF CHRISTMAS by Krista Besselman

TOP SCHOOLS IN NORTHERN IRELAND

Sister Barbara Bailey drew attention to this good news about the success of Rathmore Grammar School, Finaghy, Belfast (founded by the RSHM). It features in the UK Sunday Times in a Top Schools supplement. It Rates 35 out of top the 100!

There is a mention, too, of Our Lady and St Patrick's College, Knock, Belfast (an amalgamation of SHM, Holywood, Co Down and St Patrick's College, Knock) which had the top 'A' Level results in Northern Ireland.

We, RSHM, can be justly proud of the two schools where many of the Sisters were involved from their foundation and in which we served for many years. Congratulations to all the Staffs, pupils and parents.

THE ARTICLE IN THE SUNDAY TIMES UK ON SUNDAY 7 DECEMBER

After years of consultation, revolution is coming to classrooms in Northern Ireland with the new TransformED NI strategy through five key reforms: curriculum overhaul for "coherent, knowledge-rich" learning; standardising assessment and qualifications at primary, lower secondary and vocational levels; better professional development for teachers; a revised qualification for school headship; and measures to tackle disadvantage.

The statutory desire to boost performance further comes as three out of ten pupils in Northern Ireland scored top marks this year, achieving A* or A grades in at least one subject. All of Parent Power's top ten schools in Northern Ireland are also ranked in the UK's top 80 state secondaries.

Some schools are already getting it right. Cliodhna Logan, head girl of Rathmore Grammar School, earned four A*s in chemistry, biology, maths and physics to read medicine at Queen's University, Belfast, and the school's results were so impressive that Paul Givan, the education minister in Northern Ireland, paid a visit to offer his congratulations.

Some of the best A-level results in a decade, and GCSEs in which 75.8 per cent of pupils gained seven grades 9-7, has led to Rathmore climbing 17 places in the UK league table to rank 35th and take the title of Secondary School of the Year in Northern Ireland.

It follows another win at the BT Young Scientist & Technology Exhibition in Dublin. Rathmore pupil Eoin Rossney-Hyde took home the first prize for his project focused on "the application of abstract mathematical theories to mitigate against racial and gender bias in AI".

Arthur Donnelly, principal of the coeducational Catholic school in Finaghy, Belfast, attributes the success "to the people and the sense of community we have. It's the bedrock of everything." Former pupils often become teachers and staff may spend their entire career at the school, while the prefect team raised more than £18,500 to support the work of Trócaire, an NGO that works to improve social justice and human rights as well as supporting a local mental health charity. But nowhere is community more celebrated than when it comes to sport, with extracurriculars including cross-country, boys' and girls' Gaelic football, football and basketball, hurling and camogie.

"Our motto, which we share with our founders, the Religious of the Sacred Heart of Mary, an international congregation of religious sisters, is UT VITAM HABEANT ('That they may have life')" Donnelly says. "I think that speaks for itself."


